What you can do on the map

Pin your habitat

Add your native plantings to the map. No account needed to explore — sign up free to track your impact and connect with neighbors.

Daily activities that support biodiversity

Ditch fogging for buckets

An alternative to pesticide spraying that controls mosquitoes without harming bees, wildlife, or people.

Protect caterpillars

Unlocking monthly steps to protect caterpillar habitats and discovering which caterpillars might already be living in their backyard.

Add native habitat

Adding habitats and becoming part of a national movement — one native plant at a time.
